Our Rap is a strong cultural document that recognises the importance that First Nations Culture plays in the life of a First Nations Student, School and Community. Uncle Norm presented the Welcome to Country and the importance to the Quandamooka Nation about the animals that the school named their sport houses after.










Hilliards NAIDOC School Performance
