It will be sad to say goodbye, however, she will not be too far away when advice is needed.


Thank you for all the time and effort you have given us, you will be missed.

Julie-Anne brings a wealth of knowledge to our school and will continue to lead us in a direction that will not only support our First Nations students, but all students at AHSHS.









Even though the day was wet, the boys revelled in the cultural connection and enjoyed a wealth of knowledge delivered by Uncle Norm and Aunty Maureen. We were Welcomed to Country by Uncle Norm and were given an in-depth insight into Quandamooka history and a chance to view display boards highlighting the achievements of our Elders.

A bush tucker morning tea was highly valued as was the MMEIC museum tour. We then visited the Polka Point Midden, Lake Bumiera (Brown Lake), Moongalba (Myora Mission) and Terra Bulla Leumeah Conservation Reserve - bush tucker walk. It was a fantastic experience that will be

valued for a long time.

"I'm a proud Mandandanji man from Roma, born and raised in Brisbane. Post high school I lived in America playing baseball professionally for the,'Texas Rangers Organisation' as one of the first Australian Aboriginals to sign a professional baseball

contract. Since returning home, I have been mentoring and working within schools assisting our indigenous youth and will continue to do so within my role as SSO for the Beyond Broncos Program. I am planning to create fulfilling opportunities for our indigenous youth which may enable them to have a sense of belonging within a safe space."
